Responsibilities:

- Meet with local community leaders to assess needs and interest in urban forestry topics.
- Help create outreach strategy for local communities.*
- Research materials on EAB, urban forestry and Tree Ambassadorship.
- Design and create unique materials for community campaigns.
- Provide hands-on support for community projects as needed.
- Staff events and give presentations.

- Experience with collaborative projects
- Good understanding of community engagement process
- Organized work style
